
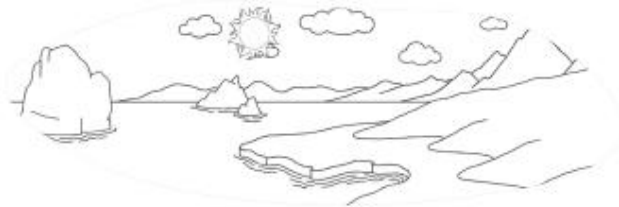

The North Pole is not a country and it is not in a country. It is in the Arctic Ocean.</p> <p>Lots of people think that the North Pole is on land but it isn't. The nearest piece of land is over 700 miles away.<sup>5</sup> The North Pole is actually covered in a very thick sheet of ice. The ice is so thick that it is possible to walk on top of it.</p> <p>4 The sun is in the sky all day and all night during the summer months at the North Pole. The sun rises each year around 21<sup>st</sup> March and does not set again until around 21<sup>st</sup> September. This means that the North Pole is sometimes called 'The Land of the Midnight Sun' because the daylight is endless.</p> <p>In the winter months, there is no sunlight at all at the North Pole.
